

Cover: Like some of us, I drive a C8 Corvette. But how does it compare to what Chevrolet has offered us in the past? The C6 Corvette is two generations old, but let's take a look at excerpts from an article about its most powerful edition, the ZR1. He misses a few things, like safety and gas mileage, and it's his opinion, but with another ZR1 coming out, I found it interesting.



10 Things That Make the Chevy C6 Corvette ZR1 Better Than The C8 Corvette BY DIMITAR ANGELOV PUBLISHED MAY 31, 2023

While the C6 Corvette ZR-1 may be more than a decade old, there are several ways in which it outshines its mid-engine sibling

The <u>Chevrolet Corvette</u> is in its eighth generation and continues to enjoy great success, both, on its home soil in the U.S., and abroad. <u>The definitive, American sports car by Chevrolet</u> has been around since 1953, and it quickly became the best value-for-money sports car, money could buy. It also made it possible for the U.S. automotive industry to give Ferrari and Porsche a run for their money. Every generation of the Chevy Corvette brought some kind of innovation for the nameplate, but when it comes to modern-day performance, the C6 ZR-1 may be the most important Corvette. Even the standard C6 Corvette was a force to be reckoned with. The Z06 was a more powerful, more track-focused version and arguably, the best driver's car of all C6 versions, but the <u>C6 ZR-1</u> was the ultimate fast Corvette when it arrived in 2009. Moreover, it packed so much performance per dollar that the <u>C7 generation that came after it</u> was almost obsolete. With the C8 Corvette being a sharp deviation from all Corvettes before it, the C6 ZR-1 remains, the most significant, high-performance Corvette in modern times. With that said, here are 10 aspects, in which the Chevrolet Corvette C6 ZR-1 is better than the C8 Stingray.

10An Appreciating American Icon - The Chevrolet Corvette C6 ZR-1 was produced between 2009 and 2013. In those five years of production, a total of 4,695 examples were built. In 2009, the starting price of a C6 Corvette ZR-1 was \$103,970. Prices bottomed out around 2021 when you could pick up a used C6 ZR-1 in good condition, for a little over \$60,000. Since then, things have changed, and prices have been on the rise.

The Classic Layout- Zora Arkus Duntov, the father of the Corvette, <u>always wanted the American sports car to be a mid-engine model</u>. Although most generations of the Chevy Corvette were accompanied by a mid-engine concept, a production version only came in 2020, with the C8 generation. The C6 Corvette ZR-1 retains the classic sports car formula of positioning the engine at the front and sending its power to the rear axle, like any production Corvette before it, and the C7 that came after it. In truth, the C7 was a more powerful C6 with a more angular design that foreshadowed the design of the mid-engine C8.

In The Real World, The C6 ZR-1 Is Faster Than The C8 - There's no doubt, the C8's mid-engine layout comes with inherent advantages, such as better off-the-line acceleration, and potentially, better weight distribution. On that front, the C6 Corvette was always a balanced car, with a near-50:50 weight distribution, GM claimed a 2.9-second 0 to 60 mph time for the C8 Stingray. Good Life 777 confirmed that even managing a 2.7-second time on one of the few attempts. The C6 ZR-1 has a slight disadvantage off the line due to its layout, but a 3.1-second run is possible, due to longer gearing - first gear is good for over 60 mph (97 km/h). The C8 was also built with downforce in mind, which

slows you down at high speeds, hence the top speed of "only" 194 mph (312 km/h) versus the much more powerful C6 ZR-1's 205 mph (330 km/h).

ZA More Engaging Car Than The C8 Stingray - The Chevy C6 Corvette ZR1 is a well-balanced car like all other versions of the C6. With that said, its driver assists are not as sophisticated as those in the new C8. It comes with the frontengine, rear-wheel-drive platform, which is more prone to kicking the tail end out, and you get a much more engaging driving experience when pushing the car near its limits. The good news is, the C6 ZR-1 is a very civil car when driven at normal speeds while the C8 Stingray feels more "nervous" at low speeds. Although most things in the C6 ZR-1 happen fairly progressively, the monstrous V-8 at the front requires you to be on top of things, when you are pushing this 'Vette through its paces.

Manual Transmission - One of the main reasons the C6 ZR-1 is a proper driver's car is that it comes with a Tremec TR6060, six-speed manual. The C6 Corvette ZR-1 is the last high-performance Corvette to be offered, exclusively, with a six-speed manual. The 3.42 rear gears give the high-power C6 plenty of room to stretch its legs all the way to 205 mph (330 km/h). For the record, the C6 ZR-1 manages 200 mph (322 km/h) on top of fifth gear and de-limited, it boasts a theoretical top speed of over 211 mph (340 km/h). The C7 also featured a manual, but it also introduced an eight-speed automatic. The same automatic is the only available transmission in all C8 versions.

EBetter Practicality - We are nit-picking here as no one buys a sports car for its practicality, but in case you care, the C6 Corvette ZR-1 is very practical for what it is. One aspect, in which the front-engine, rear-wheel-drive platform has a clear advantage is storage space. The C6 Corvette puts to shame, not just the C8 Stingray, but also many modern-day, sedans, hatchbacks, and even some station wagons, as it offers 22.39 cubic feet (634 liters) of cargo space. Moreover, there's a hatchback tailgate for even more practicality, which is a strong argument in front of your better half. Meanwhile, the C8 Corvette offers 12.6 cubic feet (357 liters), which is comparable to a sub-compact hatchback. Moreover, it's separated into two areas - a "frunk" and a rear storage area behind the engine.

4More Power, Baby! - Another aspect, in which the C6 Corvette ZR-1 offers more than the C8 Corvette is raw power. The 6.2-liter, supercharged, LS9 V-8 produces 639 horsepower at 6,500 RPM and 604 pound-feet (819 Nm) at 3,800 RPM while the C8's 6.2-liter, naturally-aspirated, LT2 V-8 packs 495 horsepower at 6,450 RPM and 470 pound-feet (637 Nm) at 5,150 RPM. Although the C8 is quicker off the line, the C6 ZR-1 more than makes up with sheer power. While quarter-mile times are near-identical, the lighter and more powerful Chevrolet C6 Corvette ZR-1 will obliterate the C8 Corvette Stingray on anything longer than 1,320 feet, or a rolling race.

The C6 ZR-1 Has More Tuning Potential - As a platform, the C6 ZR-1 has been around for much longer than the C8 Corvette. The C6 platform benefits greatly from a wide variety of aftermarket upgrades, some of which are available directly from the manufacturer. Then, you have the tried-and-tested LS platform, which is capable of great power with a large number of performance mods readily available. More importantly, the C8's E.C.U is locked from the factory, in order to make tuners' life more unbearable. To this day, people are having trouble cracking the C8's control unit, which prevents them from making more power reliably. The C6 came out way before such restrictions and is practically begging for four-digit horsepower figures.

2Better To Look At - Aesthetics are subjective, but when the C8 Corvette came out, many thought it looked like a midengine Camaro from behind. The front was sharp and not that dissimilar to the likes of the Ferrari 488 and company while the rear was much squarer, making it look like the C8 Corvette was made of two completely different cars. Somehow, that mashup of design cues works and people warmed up to it, but most will agree that the C6's curvaceous lines and classic proportions are a much more pleasant view. The sixth-generation Corvette is more in tune with all Corvettes that came before it, featuring not just a traditional, FR layout, but also signature design elements like the quad round taillights that date back to the 1953 C1, and the four stacked exhaust tips, first seen on the C4 Corvette.

More Reliable Than A C8 Corvette - The Corvette C6 has stood the test of time and is considered one of the most reliable sports cars money can buy. Its simplicity and stout mechanicals mean, upkeep will not break the bank as long as you get a good, looked-after example. The C8 Corvette had a predicted reliability score of 2/5 for the first year and a 3/5 for the second year. With that said, certain areas to look out for with a C8 include electronic and powertrain issues, trim, paint, and body. C8 Corvettes also had a few recalls, concerning the front trunk opening and missing transmission bearings, although the latter included just 22 units. Meanwhile, the C6 ZR-1 never had any recalls, and no major issues have been documented over the years.

Prospective Members Jim and Nancy McGoldrick



When you adjust the park brake, make sure they don't drag or they will over heat and cause problems. They won't designed to stop the car and can't hold the car on a big hill.

I like the idea of cutting the cross member to get the transmission out because GM did the same thing when then they put in auto transmissions in.

As for Nick's 1966 corvette, if is still at the body shop waiting for paint.

Rosie and I already did two trips, and 1000 miles on our C7 corvette .We are planning to go to a corvette convention in Kentucky, where GM builds corvettes. It is a 2 day drive to get there and 5 days of, car shows, drag racing, high and low speed race track driving. There will also be parties and all kinds of event tours like going to the corvette factory. Rosie and I have attended about 22 of these events in a different city every year. It is fun. Hi Pete, hope you all well, had the 72 up on the lift yesterday, took up the end float in the front wheel bearings, and changed out the diff cushions to see if it was the cause of my drivetrain clunk. I couldn't see any movement in any of the universal joints. I only went for a short test as it was dark but seemed to be better. Will take it out again today for a longer test. The old rubbers didn't look too bad as I guess they were new when you restored it.

Adjusted the park brake up again while she was in the air, pretty reasonable now, ... (for a C3!) Had a good look around the trans and crossmember to plan for my big job when I cut out the crossmember to fit the removable flange kit . 

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
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






















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
